Milena Dragićević Šešić,

Head of UNESCO's chair in Interculturalism, Art Management and Mediation, Belgrade, Serbia

Milena Dragićević Šešić is currently the Head of UNESCO's chair in Interculturalism, Art Management and Mediation. She is also working as Professor at the University of Arts in Belgrade for the field of Cultural Policy & Cultural Management; Cultural Studies and Media Studies. She was the former President of the University of Arts in Belgrade and member of the National Council for Science.

In 1990, she received a PhD degree in Literature and Communication. She was a Board member of the European Diploma in Cultural Project Management; Board member of ENCATC and ELIA; adviser to the Minister of Culture of the Republic of Serbia and worked for the French Ministry of Education. She provides guest lectures at universities and published 17 books and more than 150 essays. Additionally, she is expert in cultural policy and management for, among others, UNESCO and the Council of Europe. She also realised and developed more than 50 projects in cultural policy and management (for example in India and Cambodia).

Péter Inkei,Director of the Budapest Observatory

Péter Inkei is the director of the Budapest Observatory: Regional Observatory on Financing Cultural in East-Central Europe. As a non-profit organisation, it conducts comparative projects on issues of cultural policy and planning. Inkei has done consultancy in various fields of cultural policy, among others for the Council of Europe, the European Commission, the Open Society Institute and the World Bank.

He also served on the board of Cultural Information and Research Centres Liaison in Europe (CIRCLE) as well as the LabforCulture of the European Cultural Foundation (ECF). Previously, he had held various positions in the civil service, including deputy State Secretary for Culture.



Oleksandr Butsenko,

Director of the Development Centre "Democracy through Culture", Ukraine

Oleksandr Butsenko is the director of the Development Centre "Democracy through Culture", adviser of the President of National Academy of Arts of Ukraine, consultant of the Verkhovna Rada (Parliament) of Ukraine Committee on Culture and Religions, member of the European Cultural Parliament, UNESCO global facilitator on intangible cultural heritage and an independent expert on cultural policies issues.

He is the initiator of government programs linked with the third sector, creative industries and cultural heritage, as well as of a set of international projects related to culture-oriented development of local communities. He was the initiator and editor-in-chief of the information bulletin "Dialogue", devoted to theory and practice of cultural policies and cultural development in Europe.





Giuliana De Francesco,

Head of Unit, Coordination of European and international affairs. Italian Ministry of Culture - Secretariat General. Department for International Relations

Giuliana De Francesco is Head of Unit for Coordination of European and international affairs at the Italian Ministry of Culture and has for several years been representative of the Steering Committee on Culture, Heritage and Landscape (CDCPP) for Italy. She is member of the Creative Europe Programme Management Committee and has a background in Classical Antiquities and as a manuscript curator and library manager.

Giuliana has multiannual experience in the coordination and management of European projects in the field of policies and programmes for cultural heritage, particularly in relation to digital technologies and research infrastructures. Seconded to the Council of Europe to serve as coordinator of the European Heritage Network (44 CoE member States) and HEREIN project manager. Later member of the coordination team of the Italian Semester of presidency of the Council of the European Union.



Carmen Croitoru

General Manager, National Institute for Cultural Research and Training

Carmen Croitoru is associate professor at the National University of Theatre and Cinematography in Bucharest since 2011. She has twenty years of experience in teaching cultural management and for the past twenty five years she has been involved in the administration and development of cultural management in Romania.

Since 2014, Carmen Croitoru is general manager of the National Institute for Cultural Research and Training (NIRCT). She is also involved in several national and international professional networks: she's the national representative member for the EU Commission for Creative Sectors, the national representative in the Steering Committee for Culture and Heritage at the Council of Europe (CDCPP), she's the founder of the Professional Association for Romanian Cultural Managers, a co-founder of the ECUMEST Association and a member of ENCATC and Europeana.

Croitoru graduated from the Academy of Theatre and Film of Bucharest in 1994 and has a Master's degree in Theatre Studies and Cultural Management, a PhD in Theatre Studies and an accreditation for training and evaluating cultural public institution managers.

Kathrin Merkle,

Head of Culture and Cultural Heritage Division, Directorate General of Democracy, Council of Europe

Kathrin Merkle heads the Culture and Cultural Heritage Division of the Directorate of Democratic Participation at the Council of Europe and as Secretary to the Steering Committee for Culture, Heritage and Landscape, coordinates the intergovernmental work of 50 states party to the European Cultural Convention. She oversees the work on Culture and Democracy Indicators, Culture and Digitisation/ AI, Freedom of Expression of the Arts and Culture and the Council of Europe's heritage standards, including the Faro and Nicosia Conventions and the European Cultural Heritage Strategy for the 21st century.

Trained as a sociologist and political scientist, Kathrin worked for UNESCO Statistics before joining the Council of Europe in 1993. Once in Strasbourg, she set up the Cultural Policies Research and Development Unit and started reflections on a soft monitoring system on cultural policies, which in 1997 led to the Compendium, developed and run jointly with ERICarts/ Bonn until end 2017.



Susanne Keuchel,

Board Member of the European Network of Observatories in the Field of Arts and Cultural Education, Germany

She is a graduated musicologist and Director of the Akademie der Kulturellen Bildung des Bundes und des Landes NRW e.V. (Academy of Arts Education of the German Government and State of North Rhine-Westphalia) as well as Chairwoman of the Federal Association of Cultural Youth Education (BKJ) and member of the Board of the European Network of Observatories in the Field of Arts and Cultural Education.

She is Honorary Professor at the Institut für Kulturpolitik (Institute for Cultural Research) at the University of Hildesheim. Her research interests are empirical cultural research and the use of new technologies in the field of Arts Education and Diversity.





Delia Mucică,

PhD Prof. National University of Theatre and Film "I.L. Caragiale" in Bucharest and Cultural Policy Expert

She holds a law degree from the University of Bucharest and a PhD in economic history, awarded by the Romanian Academy. She is a professor at the National University of Theatre and Cinema "I. L. Caragiale" Bucharest and teaches courses centred on cultural policies and legislation, as well as on cultural management. Her teaching experience has been enriched by courses at the Higher School of Journalism in Bucharest and, as a visiting professor, at the University of Arts in Belgrade.

In her career, she has held the position of Secretary General in the Ministry of Culture, as well as other managerial positions in the same Ministry and in the National Centre of Cinematography, among others. As an independent expert of the Council of Europe, he has participated in cultural policy evaluation missions in 5 member states and has been active in various steering committees, working groups and expert committees at both the Council of Europe and the European Commission. She was the coordinator of the Sectoral Strategies for Culture for the periods: 2004-2006, 2007-2013 and 2014-2020.

Delia Mucică is the author and co-author of numerous specialist papers published both in Romania and in other countries. She participated in and moderated over 50 international conferences and seminars.



Andreas Wiesand,

Executive Director, European Institute for Comparative Cultural Research (ERICarts), Germany

Executive Director, European Institute for Comparative Cultural Research (ERICarts); Professor emeritus for cultural policy in Hamburg (but still lecturing at Dresden International University). Worked first as a journalist in broadcasting, in book publishing, at DER SPIEGEL news magazine and 1972-2008 as Co-Director of Centre for Cultural Research in Hamburg, Bonn and Vienna (ZfKf), with a focus on cultural professions and arts, heritage and media policies.

In collaboration with colleagues, he developed the concept of the "Compendium of Cultural Policies and Trends in Europe" (www.culturalpolicies.net) in 1998/89 and acted as its co-editor unti the end of 2017, together with Kathrin Merkle (Council of Europe). Expert for the EU (e.g. Team Leader "Culture-Biz", "Sharing Diversity", "Mobility Matters"); UNESCO; ECF; etc. Missions around the world for development agencies; the Goethe Institute; etc. (Co-)Author or editor of over 50 publications, including "Culture and Human Rights: The Wroclaw Commentaries" (2016).

Levan Kharatishvili, CEO & Founder, Creative Strategies Lab, Georgia

Levan Kharatshvili is an internationally renowned expert in cultural policies and creative industries strategies as he has conducted evaluations, cultural policy reviews, projects and trainings, given speeches and advised governments or cultural operators in more than 15 countries around the world.

Levan worked at the Ministry of Education, Science, Culture and Sport of Georgia in 2013-2021 as a Deputy Minister and was responsible for Culture and Creative Industries, Strategy Development and International Relations. His name is associated with elaboration and adoption of the first culture strategy document – Culture Strategy 2025 and its action plans. He was Chair of the Steering Committee for Culture, Heritage and Landscape of the Council of Europe as well as Vice-Chair of the Governing Board at the Cultural Routes of the Council of Europe.He is working as a cultural and creative sectors expert at the EU-Eastern Partnership Culture and Creativity Programme, advising governments, cultural operators and other stakeholders from Ukraine, Georgia, Moldova, Armenia, Azerbaijan and Belarus.



Jaka Primorac,

Senior Research Associate at the Department for Culture and Communication, Institute for Development and International Relations, Croatia

She holds a PhD (2010) in Sociology from the Zagreb University Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences. Her research interests intersect the fields of sociology of culture, sociology of media and communications and sociology of work. Her work focuses on the relationship between culture and economy, with the particular focus on cultural and creative labour issues and implications for cultural and media policies.

Primorac collaborated on a number of research projects in Croatia and abroad (e.g. Jean Monnet project CULPOL, "Access to culture. Policy analysis" by the EU Program Culture, COST Network "Dynamics of Virtual Work", FP7 project MEDIADEM, cultural policy expertise for the European Parliament, a short term consultancy in cultural policy issues for the World Bank). Since 2008 she is a co-author of the Croatian country profile for the Compendium of Cultural Policies and Trends. Since 2015, she is the member of the Presidency of the Croatian Sociological Association (HSD) and a member of the editorial board of Revija za sociologiju/Sociological Review.





Adrian Debattista, Head of Strategy at Arts Council Malta

He graduated from the University of Malta with a Bachelor's degree in Economics and later completed a MA in Arts and Cultural Management at Queen Margaret University, Edinburgh after being awarded an ESF funded scholarship. His dissertation was a research project focusing on shifting identities and roles of independent live music promoters in Malta as cultural intermediaries and their mobilisation of social, cultural and symbolic capital in stakeholder management.

Since 2015, he has been a research associate at the Arts Council Malta where he develops and manages the council's research programme as per its strategy, with the aim to produce a knowledge base from which effective policy recommendations can be made.

Recently, Debattista was appointed by the Culture Directorate within the Ministry for Culture as a member of the working group designing and drafting Malta's next National Cultural Policy document for the years 2020-2025.

COVID-19 regulations

TRAVELING:

COVID-19 travel restrictions have been lifted in Romania.

Providing proof of vaccination, recovery from COVID-19 or negative test results is no longer necessary, and travellers are not subject to quarantine anymore.

WITHIN THE COUNTRY:

According to a press release issued by the Romanian Interior Ministry, the requirement to present COVID-19 related documents, restrictions, and prohibitions such as the closed border crossing points, obligation to wear protective masks, organising rallies, concerts, sports events, and working from home in a bid to protect the public health, will no longer apply in Romanian territory.
